Art is a powerful source of inspiration and connection, reflecting the rich tapestry of culture, identity and aspirations. Across the region, fresh opportunities await artists to pursue their creative visions and illustrate their experiences through artistic expressions. In the 42^{nd} edition of the UOB Painting of the Year (POY) competition, we are heartened to have received a record number of entries across Southeast Asia.

This year, we launched the first UOB POY competition in Vietnam, bringing our flagship art competition to a fifth country in Southeast Asia. The expansion into Vietnam reinforces our long-term commitment to supporting visual art and artists in Southeast Asia. The entries present the ingenuity of artists in depicting narratives that captivate and resonate with the audiences. The artworks draw attention to social commentary, highlighting social and environmental issues, and the importance of social changes.

As a leading patron of the arts in Asia, we continue to give back to the community through a diverse range of visual art programmes, partnerships and community outreach. Guided by our purpose of 'Building the future of ASEAN', we are committed to doing right by our community in this region, uncovering and nurturing talents, and providing them with opportunities to showcase their creativity.

In Singapore, more than 2,000 art students have benefitted from our Artist's Conversation programme where our UOB POY artists shared art techniques and their artistic journeys. This year, we also launched #ArtforGood, a charity sale of a range of art wearables, co-designed by UOB POY artists and artists with special needs.

During the year, UOB FinLab and National Arts Council Singapore jointly organised the first run of the Acceleration Programme for the Arts, helping more than 20 art organisations to strengthen their businesses and digital capabilities.

In our efforts to champion Southeast Asian art, we will also collaborate with National Gallery Singapore to present the 2023 UOB POY Regional Winners' Showcase to locals and tourists to grow the appreciation of art.

Across our regional footprint, UOB returned as the Lead Partner of Art Central Hong Kong and Art Jakarta, profiling our winning artists on the international stage. In China, we launched the inaugural UOB Art in Ink Awards Campus Edition to help uncover young artists and promote a traditional Chinese art form.

This year, our UOB Art Academy in Hong Kong is officially established as a charitable organisation, the first across UOB Group. The academy is committed to making a positive community impact through art. Founded in 2015, the academy aims to garner greater collective support from our stakeholders with its new charity status through partnerships and sponsorships.

I would like to congratulate all our winners and thank our esteemed judges and partners who have helped make our journey in art possible. With exciting possibilities ahead, we look forward to building a thriving art scene in Singapore, and to enabling artistic talents to scale greater heights.

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UOB Painting of the Year Iconic Award Trophy

Design inspired by Vitalità by Anna Chiara Spellini

On the 40^{th} Anniversary of the UOB Painting of the Year regional art competition in 2021, we introduced a new iconic award trophy design. It is modelled after *Vitalità* (生命力), a bronze sculpture by foremost Italian sculptor, Ms Anna Chiara Spellini. The sculpture was specially commissioned by UOB.

In the concept of 'dao' (道), the vital energy of the universe is 'qi' (气). Embodying the 'qi' in the visceral line of this sculpture, Ms Spellini has endowed the form of *Vitalità* with the vigour of being ready to move upward and forward. It is a life force that creates newness, growth, good fortune and abundance for all.

Vitalità begins life as a pillar of strength that also represents a form of physical movement, as though stepping forward. The front of the sculpture is arched backward, while the back is like a curved bow, ready to spring out.

The iconic UOB Painting of the Year award trophy, which also demonstrates the spirit of the UOB brand, aims to illuminate the passion of artists, inspiring their imagination and ingenuity as they express their artistic vision.

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Doing right by our communities through #ArtforGood

Apart from nurturing great Southeast Asian artists through artist residencies and international art fairs, UOB also rallies its art community, ecosystem partners and UOB POY artists to forge greater social impact and foster deeper art appreciation among young budding artists, children from disadvantaged families as well as those with special needs. In the spirit of #ArtforGood, we collaborate with partners through art workshops, commissioned artworks and projects, outreach and volunteerism to uplift our communities.



42nd UOB Painting of the Year (Singapore) Launch

To commemorate the 42nd UOB POY launch this year, a collection of 36 limited-edition art wearables was launched and co-designed by 10 UOB Painting of the Year artists and artists with special needs from JOURNEY by TOUCH Community Services (a local charity). The exquisite pieces, which illustrate how art can be present in our everyday lives, including fashion, was introduced at a fashion showcase for charity sale at the launch at National Gallery Singapore.

All proceeds have been benefiting TOUCH Community Services to promote art and education for special needs groups.

2023 UOB Painting of the Year

Artist: Jeremy Hiah Gulliver's Travels Title:

Medium: Mixed media on canvas (Acrylic paint and pen ink)

Size (cm): **76** x **196**

Gulliver's Travels is inspired by the adventure story of Lemuel Gulliver, who was washed ashore as the sole survivor of a shipwreck during his travel to remote regions and held captive by a race of tiny people.

The artwork represents the concept of a lockdown seen in the form of a restricted human body surrounded and plagued by tiny viruses, animals and machineries, creating a vivid scene of confinement during a haunting night.

About the artist

Jeremy High is an interdisciplinary artist and curator whose works question the social systems we live in, using satire and an ironic sense of humor. Following his graduation from LASALLE College of the Arts/ RMIT University in Singapore, he continued to focus on paintings, and explore different medias such as sculpture, installations, and performance.

He has held numerous solo and group exhibitions at the Museum of Something, Thailand; Singapore Art Museum (SAM), Sydney Museum of Contemporary Art, Australia; and Kedai Kebun Forum in Indonesia. Jeremy's works have been collected by the SAM; National Gallery Singapore, ASIATOPIA Foundation Thailand, AIR 3331 as well as many private collectors.

Hong Sek Chern Artist: Accretion/Dissolution Title: Medium: Ink on rice paper

Size (cm): 110 x 150

Accretion/Dissolution is part of a About the artist series of paintings inspired by fire and water which engulfed the artist's studio 10 years ago - with the ceiling charred from the fire and floors flooded by the firefighters' water. However, the main motivation to create the series was the frequent forest fires that raged in mainland Southeast Asia and Canada in early 2023, as well as torrential rains flooding homes in California and Uganda, affecting millions of lives.

The ink used in her artwork is made from fire and water as well - soot from burnt barks of trees mixed in water for activation. The spaces depicted in the artwork were created by appropriating photographs uploaded by the public on apps such as Google Maps, using paper mounting to create a doubling of painted layers. The ambivalent gap can imply either an opening or closing strata of space which are intended to suggest a liminality of ambiguous outcomes.

Hong Sek Chern enjoys exploring various themes within urban settings in her paintings. She focuses on traditional Chinese ink, applying contemporary strategies to push the possibilities of the traditional medium. Sek Chern is a graduate from the Nanyang Academy of Fine Arts, Singapore and Goldsmiths College, University of London, United Kingdom.

A multiple UOB Painting of the Year award winner. Sek Chern has held seven solo exhibitions in Singapore and participated in group exhibitions held locally and overseas. She was selected to participate in the President Young Artist Show organised by the Singapore Art Museum in 2001. In 2002, she represented Singapore at the 25th Sao Paolo Biennale and the 5th International Ink Painting Biennial of Shenzhen in 2006. She was also the recipient of the Young Artist Award conferred by the National Arts Council Singapore in 2000.

Title: Preserving Peaks - Brush Strokes Unbound

Medium: Mixed media on canvas

(Acrylic, archival ink, ceramic stucco and charcoal)


Preserving Peaks - Brushstrokes Unbound depicts a harmonious co-existence of tradition and innovation, past and future. This artwork is inspired by the Mustard Seed Garden Manual of Painting and the brushstrokes of Mifu, a Song dynasty Chinese painter and poet who invented the "Mi" (米) or rice dots to paint his famous misty landscapes.

It explores the possibilities of a future between nature and technology, ancient wisdom and modern advancements seen in futuristic humancarrying drones, collapsible solar-powered houses, portable satellites, and wind turbines against the natural landscape of towering mountains. Viewers are also invited to appreciate the balance of responsible human activities and the conservation of our natural world.

About the artist

Ho Seok Kee won the Silver Award, Established Artist Category in the 2018 UOB Painting of the Year (Singapore) and Third prize in the 2023 Saranggong Art Prize, organised by One Farrer Hotel. She held her first solo exhibition in 2020, and participated in various group shows locally as well as in China.

Besides her art practice, she conducts Art and Wellness programmes for seniors. As a wellness coach and advocate, Seok Kee is also passionate about working with institutions on programmes to support and empower persons in recovery from mental health conditions to live with dignity in a caring and inclusive society.

Om Mee Ai Artist: R152-QUF Title: Medium: Oil on canvas Size (cm): 92 x 152

R152-QUF is inspired by Beethoven's piano composition, Moonlight Sonata and conveys a visual interpretation of a complex emotional scape. The underlying narratives of tenderness, desperation, sorrow, happiness and melancholy are portrayed in the form of a geometric abstract visual through a meticulous and repetitive technique of "taping, layering and wiping".

Art is a reflection of an internal reality and should intrigue and hopefully uplift the spirit, emotions, and mind. The artist tries to achieve this through an abstract painting technique that displays the mixture of multiplied grids and translucent layers of colours. She sees abstract paintings as an open-ended dialogue between the artist, artwork, and audience.

About the artist

Om Mee Ai is a veteran artist known for her meticulously executed geometric abstract paintings that demonstrate a painstaking dedication to layers and details. She is a multiple-award winner of the UOB Painting of the Year competition, with her latest in 2014 as the Top Winner and in 2019, Highly Commended in the Established Artist Category.

She has participated in numerous group and solo exhibitions and received several recognitions, including the ASEAN Art Awards by Philip Morris. Her artworks are collected by Singapore Art Museum, Ministry of Foreign Affairs Singapore, Ministry of Manpower Singapore, Philip Morris Singapore, European Financial Group and INSEAD Business School. Her public art murals are also permanently on display at Stevens MRT Station in Singapore and at West Kowloon Station in Hong Kong.

Title: Everyday Tapestry
Medium: Pigment on sandpaper

Size (cm): 140 x 174

Everyday Tapestry investigates the luminal space of the common void decks (open spaces on ground floors of public housings buildings in Singapore) and the mundane. Intendedly left empty, the artwork is an open void deck inviting the audience to think beyond the tangible elements and imagine activities within the space. The artwork is produced on recycled sandpaper with pigments sanded off objects collected by the artist around places of interest. The process of creating this artwork recognises the beauty of common spaces and the shared interactions.

About the artist

William Goh is actively involved in the arts scene. In 2020, he obtained his Bachelor in Arts (Education) from Nanyang Technological University, Singapore. The artist is keen in exploring the process and materiality of art-making as well as creating artworks using both conventional and unconventional techniques.

Title: Beyond the Dancing Leaves

Medium: Mixed media on paper

(Chinese ink and gold)

Beyond the Dancing Leaves depicts a small beautiful city built on the strong foundation of harmony, tolerance, respect and love. Here, joyful little creatures in the artwork resemble happy ballerinas dancing, the fluttering leaves are like golden fireflies bringing well wishes, with animals running and birds flying freely among grasses swaying with the wind.

The bronze antique background bears a reminder to preserve nature for our future generations as the artwork depicts a luscious mix of greenery, nature and modern architecture transforming into a vibrant land of peace and harmony.

About the artist

Wong Yee Heng is an interior designer and has always enjoyed art-making. He has been participating in art competitions, specialising in Chinese ink, with his subject matters revolving around nature, reality and fantasy.

Yee Heng was awarded the Silver Award, Emerging Artist Category of the 2021 UOB Painting of the Year (Singapore), and had his winning artwork selected as the cover of the 2021 UOB Annual Report. His artworks are also exhibited in China.

2023 Most Promising Artist of the Year

Title: Commuting
Medium: Oil on linen
Size (cm): 100 x 120

Commuting depicts the symbiotic relationship between Singapore and Malaysia commuters and their connected journey across the Straits. Motorcycles have been woven into the fabric of daily life and its interweaving threads against bustling cityscapes form a vibrant tapestry that binds the two nations within close proximity together.

The vivid picture of motorcycles represents freedom, individuality and cultural fusion. This artwork invites viewers to consider their paths ahead towards sustainable transportation solutions while preserving the rich cultural heritage of our communities.

About the artist

Stephy Chien is a budding artist who works with images from her surroundings. Her keen observations have led her to look deeper into the subtle symbolisms around her. She is an avid artist who specialises in oil paintings.

Title: Just Here and Counting

Just Here and Counting is a working series that correlates time and memory through spaces. It serves as a reminiscing of the artist's growing years with her family. Using linear forms, this work presents an overlapped imagery of nature through time.

About the artist

Nurul Afiqah Binte Mohamad Suhaimi graduated with a Diploma in Western Painting at the Nanyang Academy of Fine Arts, Singapore and a Bachelor's Degree in Fine Arts at the School of Creative Arts and Media, University of Tasmania, Australia.

She is an atelierista (art teacher) and an art specialist at an international preschool in Singapore. Majored in painting, Afiqah's works play around with the subtlety of lines that constitutes the notion of temporality the existence and perception of self and space in real time, capturing the memory and intimacy within the temporary.

Artist: Bong Chai Lee

Title: Home

Medium: Acrylic on canvas

Size (cm): 60 x 50

Home is inspired by an olive-backed sunbird's nest that was built outside a massive ongoing construction. Despite its size, the small fragile nest attracted the artist's attention, reflecting home and beauty in nature.

The artist likens sunbird to human - despite our differences, we share the same intention and hope in building our homes.

Using a combination of blue pea flowers (a vine plant commonly found in Singapore) and sunbird to authenticate *Home*, the artist also added typical materials of the nest like dried leaves, seed pots, and tree bark to illustrate construction and build the relation between her subjects.

About the artist

Bong Chai Lee graduated in 1995 with a Diploma in Graphic Design. Her strong passion for art prompted her to pursue a Bachelor in Fine Arts at the Nanyang Academy of Fine Arts, Singapore.



Bronze

Artist: Choo Weilin
Title: Balancing Act
Medium: Pencil on rice paper

Size (cm): 138 x 64

Balancing Act reflects mounds of stones placed and stacked by hikers along a walking trail.

The act of stacking requires great patience and effort as a weight as light as a bird or small as an eraser can threaten it with collapse or change its shape. The artist uses a pencil to laboriously and meditatively illustrate the stacking structure physically, one stone on top of one another, while showing unease and tension experienced with our environment in the process.

About the artist

Choo Weilin is currently an art teacher in a local secondary school. She pursued an illustration course in Ecole Superieure des Arts – Epinal and a foundation course at the Imperial Academy of Art in St Petersburg, Russia to establish a stronger foundation in academic art.

Weilin has previously held a solo exhibition *In Plein Sight (2021)* featuring scenes from Singapore and St Petersburg, Russia. The exhibited works were completed on site in Russia and Singapore.

Title: Garden City #6
Medium: Chinese ink on silk

Size (cm): 120 x 126

Garden City #6 illustrates the complexities of life in a city and constraints that city dwellers are subjected to in their dispositions.

With rampant consumerism and popular materialistic beliefs, life in a bustling city may lead to individuals' depreciating focus on the important human condition (life, death, emotion, morality etc). The intertwined figures and closely stacked structures symbolise our need for space within cluttered buildings while in search of purpose and direction.

About the artist

Andrew Huang graduated from School of the Arts, Singapore in 2022 and has works exhibited in both the Eastern and Western spheres. He won the Highly Commended, Emerging Artist Category in the 2022 UOB Painting of the Year (Singapore) and is also a strong advocate in championing social causes through his art with funds raised for local charities like the National Kidney Foundation, Tad Charity, and The Business Times Budding Artists Fund.

Andrew's works extend beyond traditional Chinese art-making. His paintings contextualise concepts of phenomenology and intentionality in Chinese ink painting into contemporary times, in search for meanings in everyday objects that revitalise lived human experiences.

His works encapsulate the inseparable relationship between Singaporeans and our urban environment, exploring how our surroundings may impact our subconscious mannerisms.

Title: Hanging Memories
Medium: Acrylic on canvas



Hanging Memories depicts a nostalgic childhood memory of the artist's grandmother religiously and meticulously hanging out fresh laundry in her backyard. A metaphor for preserving and cherishing memories, the simple and warm act of hanging laundry serves as a nostalgic reminder on the passage of time and stories woven into the fabric of our lives. Here, each piece of clothing represents a different memory and a unique moment frozen in time.

While celebrating the ordinary moments that make up the tapestry of our lives, the artist hopes viewers could reconnect with their own memories and experiences to find beauty in the simplicity of everyday life.

About the artist

Ng Swee Hua is an art director by profession with 30 years of experience in the advertising and design industries. He has participated and won the Chingay Float Design, amidst other renowned design awards such as the Apple Design Award.

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

Tranquility is inspired by nature and the philosophy of Bhuana Agung (macrocosmos) and Bhuana Alit (microcosmos), a unity of the rhythm of human life with nature as a complete ecosystem.

Growing up in the Sanur coastal area of Indonesia, the artist documented natural materials she found and observed coral reef debris washing up on beaches leaving unique patterns that form naturally over a long period of time. She recognised a similar process in humans' bodies and souls against the natural cycles of space and time.

The artwork reflects this ecosystem of spirituality in humans, especially in the context of survival with nature and culture.

About the artist

Balinese carvings that were previously hand-crafted on wood and stone have been now replaced by plastic printed using 3D printer machines and artificial intelligence (AI) programmes. The artist regards these artifacts as a contradict to the Balinese culture and a reminder of an undesirable future.

About the artist

I Gusti Agung Gede Jemana Murti completed his undergraduate education at Nanyang Academy of Fine Arts, Singapore in 2020. His artistic practice stems from his life experiences as a Balinese and observations in the religious aspects of Bali with creation consisting of paintings, sculptures and large-scale installations.

In 2019, he participated in the group exhibition, *The New Now 3: Convergence* by Gajah Gallery Singapore and the National Gallery of Singapore's Benefit Auction in 2022. 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

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

7°49'03.3"S 110°21'00.2"E depicts the concept of space distortion in the virtual world. The shape of the canvas and depiction of objects in this artwork resemble images seen through a convex lens – a simple device that has been used for centuries to focus and magnify light.

As a metaphor, the lens refers to the idea of the media creating misperceptions. While human perception shapes sensory information into meaningful representations of experience, this representation is not perfect but distorted. The title of this artwork is the coordinates of a location in the city of Yogyakarta, Indonesia that the artist found on Google Maps. The view of these city walls are traces of urban culture in Indonesia in the 21st century that represents the authentic expression of its people.

About the artist

Begok Oner was born in Cilacap, Central Java, and now based in the city of Yogyakarta, Indonesia. Starting his career as a street artist, he began actively participating in exhibitions since 2017. Apart from working independently on the streets, he also actively participates in various fine art exhibition activities, including *ARTJOG Expanding Awareness* at the Jogja National Museum in 2022.

The bright light above his head represents wisdom and promises that illuminate his mind; the orange rope represents the hope of achieving happiness. The figure holds a glimmer of light that keeps the artist alive - he dedicates this work as a therapy and support to patients and survivors in their mental health journeys.

About the artist

Since 2022, Nathaniel Pius Amaris Heru Brahmana have produced many works inspired by his personal mental health disorder with Schizoaffective, Bipolar and Attention Deficit disorders. He uses art as therapy and enjoys music and literature as well. He actively participates in various community activities as an advocate in the healing power of art. Amaris has participated in several national scale exhibitions, including the 2022 UOB Art exhibition titled *At One Time*.

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

Malaya and British Borneo One Dollar 1953 (We look at the past, we look at the present) features two identical banknotes from the British-Malaya era. The artwork evokes a sense of nostalgia for the time when the currency was in circulation across Malaya, Singapore, Sarawak, North Borneo, Brunei and the Riau archipelago from 1953 to 1967.

The upper banknote represents the past and its historical context. Its foil paper creating a mirrored surface that reflects the viewers' silhouette. The laterally-reflected lower banknote provides viewers a unique perspective of aligning themselves with the portrait and reflect on the changes in history. This juxtaposition symbolises the past and present, encouraging viewers to gaze into the present through the lens of history.

Through the artwork, the artist explores the relationship between money and art, as well as Malaysia's modern and historical narrative. This exploration prompts questions about the fluctuating value of

artists and their artworks over time. Just like an old bank note that appreciates in value over the years; who determines its value? It playfully challenges an artist's pursuit of commercial value in the art world.

About the artist

Chong Kim Chiew holds a Bachelor of Arts in Fine Art (Oil Painting) from the Guangzhou Academy of Fine Art, China. He is an artist and curator who works with different mediums, methodologies and paradigms.

He has participated in numerous group exhibitions and held six solo exhibitions from 2005 to 2021. He has exhibited internationally in *Busan Biennale* (2022) in South Korea, 10th Asia Pacific Triennial of Contemporary Art (2021) in Australia, ARTJOG 8 (2015) in Indonesia, Open Sea in the Museum of Contemporary Art, Lyon (2015) in France and Panorama: Recent Art from Contemporary Asia (2012) in Singapore. His works are collected by the Singapore Art Museum and the Queensland Art Gallery.

In the Quiet Whiteness, the Darkened Silence Resonates is a triptych inspired by an encounter with a blind masseur, whose contentment, despite lacking in sight, sparked an exploration of perception beyond the physical realm. It invites viewers on a journey of introspection and self-discovery, challenging conventional perspectives of perception and spiritual understanding.

The first panel features a veiled figure, blindfolded and draped, with hands clasping a walking stick and a bell. The blindfold serves as a poignant reminder of our reliance on vision, while the stick and bell represent alternate ways to navigate the world.

The second panel showcases an excerpt from Ibn Al-Khatir's Tafseer on Surah Al-Hajj: 46, with its meaning obscured by heavy redaction. The boldness of the obliterated text, contrasting with the preceding panel's silent imagery, compels viewers to seek meaning beyond the visible.

The final panel is a pure white canvas, embossed with braille that reads "God does not look at your forms and possessions but your hearts and deeds". This reiterates the motif of the blind masseur's wisdom, reminding us to view the world not merely with our eyes, but also with our hearts.

About the artist

Nik Ashri Bin Nik Harun is a self-taught artist that has been drawn to the arts since young. His art journey is inspired by the depth of Romanticism - expressed through charcoal and creating works that reflects his personal experiences. He is also multiple-times winner of the UOB Painting of the Year (Malaysia) - Gold Award, Emerging Artist Category in 2021; and Silver Award, Established Artist Category in 2022, showing his evolution as an artist. His artworks were also showcased in the Malaysian Emerging Artist Award 2022 and HOM Art Open 2023. He aims to connect deeply with viewers through his art, making every piece a shared emotional journey.

This dissonance of red and blue conveys the ambiguous nature of fate.

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

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

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
