Mr Gong's impression of Singapore is that of a dense and compact city with pockets of sparkling light and space. His work synthesises the aesthetics of Western stained glass panels distinctive with their coloured illumination, and the versatility and fluidity of Chinese ink brushwork. The artist creates visual rhythms through alternating solid ink strokes with delicate patterning. Looking through his glass windows one can gaze at the city's old colonial architecture.

The painting is a reenergising take on the shanshui (mountain/water) tradition in Chinese ink painting.

Ms Tan paints the emblems of her childhood - the manual Singer sewing machine with its Chinese-doll pincushion, the paper bola (Malay for ball) and her mother's patchwork quilt. The vintage sepia photographs on the wall capture important childhood memories and These milestones. objects, largely phased out in contemporary life, embody security, and joyfulness.

Ms Tan's memories are far from faded and are recorded with precision and vividness.

The shoes are a representation of Singaporeans from all walks of life, reflecting that everyone has a role to play in reducing the risk of virus transmission.
